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JOINT CHAIRMEN'S REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2014

We are pleased to present our Accounts covering our fourth year of operation ending on 31st March 2014.

The Friends now has an established pattern involving the organisation of two principal social events each year, our Brook Green Day Fair in September and our inter-street Quiz night in January. Though these require a lot of volunteer effort, they appear to be genuinely enjoyed and serve our aim to foster the sense of community in the Brook Green locality.

We are deeply grateful to our many regular volunteers from the Community and to our Estate Agent sponsors (Finlay Brewer, Beactive Lesley Marsh, Tates, March & Parson, Savills and KFH) and their staff, without all of whose help, these events would not be possible in their current form.

Our events programme also serves an important economic function. By hosting them, we are able to generate a sufficient surplus which more than covers our operating costs. Even on the parsimonious basis we operate by, these amounts to about £5,000 p.a. including the costs for the required examination of our Accounts.

As a result we are again able in 2014/15 to continue our policy of not charging an annual subscription to Friends and of providing services such as our website and our newsletter on an entirely free basis.

We use our remaining financial surplus from these activities, which in the year to 31st March 2014 amounted to almost £6,000, to protect the Green over the long term and/or to augment other funds that we have succeeded in raising for the betterment of the Green by way of donation or grant award. In 2013/14 donations received amounted to almost £45,000 and these monies will be used to preserve and improve the Green, including in the construction of the community's long desired pavilion to house toilets and a kiosk service near to the playground and the tennis courts.

In 2013/14 we also applied successfully for section 106 commitments from development schemes in which process we received invaluable support from Councillor Joe Carlebach, one of our Avonmore and Brook Green councillors.

The purpose of these commitments is to defray the impact of commercial property development on infrastructures in the locality by making money available for the betterment of local facilities. As a public park that is hugely valued but heavily stressed, it is right that Brook Green should benefit from such funding. The bulk of the commitments we have received from this source remains unspent- though some was applied to cover about one third of the cost of the playground redevelopment in 2012 and some is being applied currently in funding part of the cost of the tennis courts' makeover. What remains will be applied in years to come in contributing to the cost of the toilets and kiosk facility, improving the area around the tennis courts and the Western Lawn, in regenerating Little Brook Green and other projects.

In February this year, we secured planning consent to undertake the makeover and upgrade of the tennis courts. We also secured grants from Inspired Facilities, a subsidiary of the National Lottery, and the Mayor of London's Sports Fund amounting to £100,000 in total towards the cost of this project. Both grants were subject to the condition that we enter into a 21 year lease with LBHF over the courts. After discussion and negotiation extending for more than 3 years, the lease was finally signed in June this year so allowing the project to proceed.

Our involvement and approach in this respect brings great benefit to the Community. It opens up sources of funding that not even the Council itself is able to access. There is no requirement or exception that the facilities should be operated to achieve a full commercial return (which means that usage charges can remain at the same level as before the makeover even though the Courts have been greatly improved) and the Community, through the Friends, gain significant influence over how the facilities will be run and used.

A major challenge throughout the year was (and even now remains) the resolution of the design for the building which will house the kiosk and toilets while also providing space for the tennis manager and our own storage requirements. We are deeply grateful for the enthusiasm, creativity, commitment and patience of our architects, de Rosee Sa, who have thus far provided their services to this project on a pro bono basis.

We never expected it would be easy but the combination of local opposition, the requirements for the Planning process and other issues has delayed matters to a much greater extent than we had hoped.

Ultimately our Board concluded that the best way to allow full community consideration of the matter, prior to the submission of our Planning Application, would be for us to call an Extraordinary General Meeting. This was held in July this year and the design which the Board had selected as our preferred option was approved by 76% of the 336 votes cast. That so many people attended the meeting at all was itself a triumph for local democracy and consultation.

JOINT CHAIRMAN'S REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2014

Since the meeting de Rosee Sa have engaged fully in the process of pre-planning evaluation with officers of LBHF's planning department and, in considering both their comments and feedback from detractors of the scheme, have made some changes to the design. We intend to publicise the final plans, which we will submit to Planning, in the coming weeks. None of us ever realised just how protracted and difficult this process would become!

As always we would like to acknowledge with thanks the time and commitment made to the Friends by all members of our Board and by the many volunteers who have helped us in facing the challenges we take on.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008), the Companies Act 2006 and the requirements of the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities.

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included on the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

Resources expended

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Unsold stock is carried at no value. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.
